



One recent morning I drove to a low-income part of Denver to meet with a spiritual director. Shortly after getting out of my car I came across a young woman, perhaps in her late teens, standing on the sidewalk - no shoes, looking disoriented, staring aimlessly. I said, "Good morning". She mumbled something about needing a ride, but did not know where she needed to go. Someone had just dropped her off there. When I tried to get more information about what she needed, she seemed frightened and turned away from me, refusing to turn back.

That familiar but wrenching sense of helplessness and sadness tackled me. Lord, have mercy! What has happened to bring her to this point? What will this day bring her? Why could I not make a difference? God, will you meet her? Will you help her? As a seminary graduate once said, "I didn't go to seminary to learn to say 'I don't know'". I could add that I didn't go to seminary so I could feel helpless. Ever felt that way, too?

Later that morning, one of our preachers spoke from 2 Corinthians 12:9 about

Paul's tormenting weakness which was the occasion for his knowledge of God's grace. Paul brackets this letter with a similar theme when he recounts in 1:9 the multiple situations of despair he endured so that he might learn to trust in God and not in himself. Is it possible that Paul saw his helpless dependence on God's grace as his primary ministry qualification?

As I prayed for you, our alumni, I asked our Lord to make His grace known in whatever challenges you face. We certainly hope that your time at Denver Seminary provided rich and meaningful resources for whatever ministry God has given you. Yet, the irony in good ministry preparation is that it must teach us how to depend on God's grace and not our own competence. More than anything, we hope the diploma on your wall represents that learning!

We're grateful that you chose Denver Seminary as the place to hone your gifts and drive your roots even deeper into the grace of God. May you find the connections and resources in this edition of the alumni newsletter encouraging instruments of God's grace for whatever you face today.







Doug's next book, *Walking Through Twilight: A Wife's Illness, a Philosopher's Lament*, will be published this fall by InterVarsity Press.




